Scene Questions for Review 1. Clearly Claudius knows Hamlet is feigning madness (see line 2) and likely believes the reason is thwarted ambition . Why then does he bother eavesdropping on Hamlet and Ophelia? Do his feelings for Gertrude play a role in his decision? 2. Explain the dramatic irony in lines 25-28. 3.
